

Who are they?

An Optometrist is a health professional who specialises in eye care and regularly examine people's eyes and prescribe glasses or lenses to correct some visual problems.

Optometrists also provide the following services:


- + Provide advice and eye health education
- + Post-surgical eye care

How can I access one?

You may find a local Optometrist in towns and often in shopping centres. You may be required to make an appointment, and will not usually need a referral.

What should I do before the appointment?

- A helpful tip is to write down any questions you have for them regarding your condition or any concerns.
- **+** You should bring any glasses or lenses with you to the appointment.



How much does it cost?

- Costs to see an Optometrist may be partially or fully covered by Medicare, however don't hesitate to contact the service provider for more information.
- + If you are prescribed glasses or lenses, these are likely to be an additional cost.

What to expect during the appointment?

- + Your Optometrist will ask questions to find out more about your symptoms and eye history.
- + Your eyes will be examined using specialised equipment and often requires you to be seated in a chair. Medicated eye drops may be used to examine your eyes. Your Optometrist will provide further information about this if needed
- You will be advised on the best management for your condition, or you may be referred to an Ophthalmologist for specialist advice and treatment.
