### Who are they?

A Pain Specialist is a doctor who specialises in diagnosing and treating different types of pain which may include:

- + Complex regional pain syndrome
- + Neuropathic pain
- + Back/Spinal pain e.g. degenerative disk disease
- Post-operative pain

#### How can I access one?

To access a Pain Specialist, you must obtain a referral which is usually written by your GP.





# What should I do before the appointment?

- Check with your Aboriginal Health Worker or GP if there are any tests you may need to do beforehand.
- + Bring your referral letter and results of any tests or scans with you.
- A helpful tip is to write down questions you have regarding your condition and raise them during your consultation.





## **Pain Specialist**

Specialist doctor in the management of pain disorders and complex pain issues.

#### How much does it cost?

Costs to see a Pain Specialist may be partially or fully covered by Medicare, however don't hesitate to contact the service provider for more information.

# What to expect during the appointment?

- Your Pain Specialist will go through your issues in detail, perform a physical examination, make a diagnosis, and offer advice on the best management and treatment. You may be referred for further investigations to help diagnose your condition or prescribed medications.
- + You may require follow-up visits to monitor your progress and response to any treatment.
- You may be referred to other health professionals to help with your condition, including a Physiotherapist, but this will depend on your condition.
