


Improving health outcomes for Indigenous communities is one of the biggest challenges facing Australia today. The Graduate Certificate in Indigenous Trauma Recovery Practice is a unique program that is designed, developed and delivered by Aboriginal health delivery experts and academics in collaboration with local Aboriginal Elders.

It is a multidisciplinary program, utilising trauma-informed principles to train graduates to apply empathy, critical thinking and collaborative practices when working with children, families, and communities who have experienced trauma.

Most importantly, this course focuses on applying Indigenous social and emotional wellbeing principles, practices, and healing frameworks to address the impacts of racism, trauma, and other factors that can have major health implications for Indigenous Australians.

COURSE STRUCTURE

The Graduate Certificate in Indigenous Trauma Recovery practice is a 20 week, self-paced, fully online delivered course that includes compulsory live online activities and webinars throughout.

In addition to the core subject Indigenous Trauma Care and Recovery Practice (18 credit points), students will choose an elective subject (6 credit points).

On successful completion of this program, you can progress into the Master of Indigenous Health with credit for subjects completed. Alternatively, eligible students can start directly in the Master of Indigenous Health, which is studied over 1.5-years full-time. Students can also choose to study part-time and work at your own pace.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

A recognised diploma, degree, graduate certificate, or in the absence of formal qualifications, provide evidence of professional equivalence that demonstrates experience working within Indigenous communities.

All applicants are required to provide a professional resume and provide a personal statement of no more than 200 words that describes the skills and experience you have that will make you successful in this course.

FEE SUPPORT

COMMONWEALTH SUPPORTED PLACES (CSPS)

UOW has government-subsidised places available for domestic students studying this course in 2023. A CSP is where the Australian Government contributes up to three quarters of your total tuition fee. To be eligible for a CSP you must be an Australian or New Zealand citizen or the holder of a permanent visa, and meet the criteria outlined at studyassist.gov.au

If you are an eligible Commonwealth supported student, you can access HECS-HELP to defer part or all of your tuition fees.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people working in a healthrelated discipline located in a rural or remote area may be eligible to apply for a scholarship to support course costs.
